Eurhythmic Teacher Tells Value of Musical Training

At the Monday night potluck dinner of the Torrance Co-operative Nursery school, the guest speaker was Irene Bland, professor of Eurhythmics at the University of Southern California.

She was introduced by Mrs. Margaret Barter, the school's director.

Mrs. Bland told the group at the word Eurhythmics was originated in Switzerland by Dalcroze. "It is the growth of musical awareness through body movements and the mastering of good listening habits. In other words eurhythmics is the learning of music through coordination of tonal and rhythmic experiences," she said.


Mrs. Bland conducts classes for the preschooler, too, and starting them at four years of age. The object of Eurhythmic class is to bring music to the child's life.

The nursery school was told

by Mrs. Bland, that she begins her class for the preschool children by allowing them to move freely in their own tempo, using such tunes as "Jim Along Josie." Gradually the child fits himself to the tempo of the music. In the beginning the child thinks the music is following him, but after awhile he learns his movements to the music.

Dynamics
The little student is also taught dynamics, or loudness and softness. This is done through creative play and intensive listening. When they students have mastered this, Mrs. Bland begins work on crescendo and decrescendo, or very loud and very soft.

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
