### Gas Company Budget Grows With Expanding Population, Business

Southern California Gas company this year budgeted nearly \$1.6 million to handle capital expenditures required by the increasing population and expanding business here in its southwest division. It was announced today by Division Manager E. F. Hawkesworth.

This amount is part of the company's overall capital budget of \$48.5 million, the largest amount in the utility's 88-year history. The capital budget is primarily used, Hawkesworth said, to cover costs of adding new customers, reinforcing the gas supply system, and to support a program for plant and property replacements and additions.

Largest single item in the southwest division budget is \$633,000 to bring gas service to

nearly 10,000 new customers expected to be added to the division during 1956. Replacing and altering older services is forecast to cost \$126,000.

Extending main pipelines to bring service to these customers required an allocation of \$462,000, while replacement of mains will require nearly \$122,000. Connecting the new meters to the distribution lines will cost an additional \$85,000.

The company's long-range building program, started after the end of World War II to provide badly needed offices and bases to carry on constantly enlarging operations, will require an expenditure during 1956 of about \$20,000, Hawkesworth said.

The utility's total record high capital budget, topping last year's by \$15.5 million, was attributed to costs of constructing a new 30-inch, 277-mile pipeline from Topock at the Arizona border to Newhall.

Public Utilities Commission hearing on the new pipeline was held January 9. Authorization was requested to build the pipeline to deliver an additional 175 million cubic feet of gas per day from mid-continent sources to Southern California. The Federal Power Commission has

already authorized the El Paso Natural Gas Co. to deliver the gas to the California border.

Total cost of the line is slated to run about \$29 million, with Southern California and Southern Counties gas companies jointly sharing the cost, about \$20.4 million for the former and \$8.7 million for the latter. The cost will be spread over a two-year period.

### WHAT DO YOU KNOW ABOUT VISION?

Grandmother told the girls in her family, "Have your ears pierced to strengthen your eyesight." The aviation cadet said, "Come on fellows, let's finish these carrots so we can pass the eye test tomorrow."

Such fallacies as these may be harmless enough. But many notions, and fears, about vision have serious consequences. Thousands of people live much of their lives with inadequate vision, unnecessarily affecting

health and happiness in far-reaching, and undreamed of, ways.

Eighty per cent of man's knowledge comes from vision, it has been said. Whatever the percentage actually is, it is vision that predominates. This is a world of seeing; man has designed his part of it to please his eye. The printed word, the signal light, the automobile, the movies, are for those who see. Yet, the average person has very meager information about his vision, though he is almost totally dependent upon his eyes to earn his living.

The following series of articles will describe the things you should know to make your vision most useful. They will deal not with the rare and improbable, nor perhaps the most dramatic, but with the real, everyday knowledge each person should possess.

The development of visual defects is not remote; if you don't have troublesome vision today, you will tomorrow. By the age of 12, 25 per cent of all children have some visual problem. At the age of 40, the number has increased to two out of every five. Beyond that, sometime in middle or later life, every person in the United States, almost with no exception, will require visual care—that is if he wants the kind of productive and joyful vision which is possible.
