Mrs. William Hiatt Enters Her Fabulous Dolls in Art Show

"I'll never mind not being wealthy. As long as I have a lot of children and a lot of dolls around me, I'll be happy," said Mrs. William Hiatt of 21503 Berendo st., Torrance.

Mrs. Hiatt who has an incredible collection of over 500 rare and imported dolls, was the first person to

enter the Annual Hobby, Art, and Flower Show scheduled for Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, April 27, 28, and 29, at the Torrance civic auditorium.

She started collecting dolls when she was a small child. "I had a favorite doll when I was a little girl," she said. "My brother crushed it, and I was heart-broken. I've been searching for that kind of doll ever since."

In searching for the little lost doll, she found others that delighted her on the way, so she began to collect them.

Then, as time went by, she began another sort of collection. She started to collect children. She and Mr. Hiatt have three grown-up sons, and one young son, Billy, who is making quite a collection for himself in the number of performances he has given as a dancer.

Whereas many people would be satisfied with four children, the Hiatts, wanted more. They take children who need love and understanding and bring them up as their own. At the present time they have seven other children as well as their son, Billy.

The children have every variety of animal around the house and yard, ranging from banty

hens to a new palomino colt. "There are no problem children," Mrs. Hiatt said. "There are only problem parents."

"I have had children come to me who were said to have been cruel to animals, so I immediately say to the child, 'Now, you are in charge of the dogs. You must see to it that they have water and food, and that no one ever hurts them, because they depend on you.' And, you know, I've never had one child who hurt an animal," she said.

"None of the children have ever touched the doll collection with anything but respect," she said, "because I let them hold the dolls and look them over thoroughly until their curiosity is satisfied. Then I explain that the dolls belong to Mother and if they were hurt Mother would be unhappy. I have never had a moment's worry after that."

Rare Items
The fabulous collection contains such rare items as four brown-eyed China dolls, a China doll, well over 100 years old, which stands as tall as a small child; and a doll that survived the Indian attacks dur-

ing the early settlement of the west.

The most valuable doll in her collection is a replica of the mother of the last Czar of Russia. There are only six of these that are known to be in existence.

A second prize award was given to her in last year's hobby show on the Frozen Charlotte dolls in her collection. The

only type of doll she does not have is a wooden doll, because she cannot find an authentic old one.

Anyone who is interested in rare dolls may call on Mrs. Hiatt, she is always looking for more dolls to add to her collection.

Although it is very valuable, she is not building it for monetary reasons, she is a true lover

of rare dolls that have a history. She raises chihuahuas and sometimes trades them for rare dolls.

As she said, perhaps one day she will find the little lost doll that started her on her search. However, in the meantime, many children have found in her the love and understanding they lost. N.B.
