Hours of operation are scheduled as follows: Monday through Friday, 10 a.m.-noon, 1 p.m.-5:30 p.m., 7 p.m.-10 p.m.; Saturday, 10 a.m.-noon, 1 p.m.-5:30 p.m.; Sunday noon-6 p.m. (Private parties Sunday morning).

Saturday and Sunday evenings have been scheduled for private groups. Cost will vary from \$40 to \$130, according to the number of members in the group (from groups up to 100 to groups over 300).

Free use of the pool has been reserved for handicap swim-

ming groups (Saturday morning between 10:30 and noon; water ballet classes, between 5:30 p.m. and 7 p.m.; and boys' water polo team programs).

Plans for a city swim program have been scheduled for Monday through Friday from 10 a.m.-12 noon and 1 p.m.-5:30 p.m., as well as Monday and Tuesday nights, 7 p.m.-8 p.m., Wednesday through Saturday nights, 7 p.m.-10 p.m. and Sunday night to 6 p.m.

Saturday and Sunday nights are available for private groups from 7 p.m.-10 p.m. and Sunday mornings from 9 a.m.-noon.

Monday and Tuesday evenings will be reserved for adult swimming lessons between 7-8 p.m.

Wednesday night between 7 p.m.-10 p.m. will be limited to Torrance high school students only.

Thursday night will be family night between 7 p.m.-10 p.m.

Friday night will be limited to adults (18 years and over).

Saturday and Sunday nights—private groups only, and Sunday morning, private groups between 9 a.m. and 12 noon.

The school district will be able to use the pool for its swim program for payment of an established fee.

There will be anywhere from four to six lifeguards on duty at all times as well as a pool manager, Van Bellehem stated.

and R-3, retail commercial and limited multiple residential) to M-1 (light manufacturing) was asked by McDonald Bros.

Don Armstrong, a local attorney who lives in Palos Verdes, appealed to the council both on a legal and moral basis to grant the zone change, claiming that it was the council's responsibility to keep this the "city of industrial opportunity."

His client, he said, has also invested a lot of money in the project, having acted in good faith.

"My moral obligations lie with the people of Torrance, not with the would-be industrialists who live in Palos Verdes, Brentwood, and so forth and who would scream to high heaven if industry were ever located there," Mayor Albert Isen declared.

Benstead and Jahn voiced similar sentiments. They indicated that they would not vote for an industrial undertaking until it provided a proper buffer zone between its activities and residential areas.
