


VISITOR

Local Members Sought By League of Women Voters

The formation of a local chapter of the League of Women Voters aroused the enthusiasm of 80 women who met last week at the Art Gallery of the Palos Verdes library. The league is a national organization having as its purpose the promotion of political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government.

Officers unanimously elected were: Mesdames Melzar Jones, president; George Kendall, first vice-president; Thomas Traeumer, second vice-president; William Martin, secretary; Ross Chiles, treasurer; Richard Barar, George Gleghorn, Thomas Kenney, Harry Morgan and Nicholas Shishkoff, directors. Mrs. George Gleghorn presented by-laws which were then adopted by the group.

Mrs. Jones, of Palos Verdes, stated that the league has received encouragement from community leaders in the area for its program of informed and non-partisan action on issues vital to every citizen. She invited all women voters of Torrance, Manhattan Beach, Redondo Beach, Hollywood Riviera, San Pedro, Hermosa Beach, Rolling Hills, Portuguese Bend, and Palos Verdes to join the new chapter.

Mrs. Robert Zerbach of Pasadena, member of the State Board of Organizers, reviewed the steps necessary to fulfill the recognition standards required by the national organization, which is composed of local and state leagues. There are 43 local leagues in California, 15 of those being in the Los Angeles area. The new chapter must complete a year of work in a provisional period before being given full status.

Color slides were shown to acquaint the new members with the history and purpose of the league. The league, an outgrowth of the women's suffrage movements prior to 1920, now has 126,000 members in 1000 communities in all the 48 states, Alaska, Hawaii and the District of Columbia.

Among the projects of the group during their first year will be a study of the financing and administration of education in California.
