Procedures for the first day of school at Torrance high school have been announced by the Counseling office.

City Given 32% Rating In Traffic Safety Test

Torrance was given an overall score of 32 per cent of its accident prevention record covering 1954-55. While the figure appears poor at first sight, the city was assured that this score is better than the score made by most cities the first year.

The thorough evaluation of Torrance's "accident prevention profile" was made by the National Safety Council. District Director George Watts reported the council's findings Tuesday. The information which was used for the evaluation of the city took three months to prepare, it was indicated.

Torrance rated as follows in the various areas. Death and injury record, 66%. Deaths have dropped from an average of nine to five which was said to be "not bad" on a national basis.

Accident records, 33%. There is need for more conscientious reporting of accidents. Torrance reported 105 non-fatal injury and property damage accidents for every fatal accident. The ratio should be 255-1.

Traffic engineering, 20%. This is difficult to make a report on and the percentage is probably low for that reason. A traffic engineer has been recommended. Other recommendations: more off-street parking; elimination of angle-parking (ties up traffic worse than parallel parking); pair parking wherever possible.

Police traffic supervision, 53%. Recommendations: an expanded police department; three more (police) clerks; more accident arrests; stricter enforcement of pedestrian regulations.

School safety, 59%. This is a good score. At the time there was no behind-the-wheel instruction. That is being started now. Schools were commended for starting this program.

Every Friday night classes will be held at McMaster park, Waiteria park, and Seaside park. Beginning December 21, there will be a monthly teenage square dance round-up in the Municipal Auditorium.

By next June, those who stay with the class will be accomplished square dancers, able to square dance in any situation.

This doesn't mean Torrance did nothing along this line. There were not enough exhibits submitted showing what has been done. Safety organization, 9%. Torrance now has a traffic safety council which it did not have at the time the study was made. The council was encouraged to start an active public safety program.
