

NORTHROP SETS UP TORRANCE FACILITY

An important addition to Torrance's growing industrial community was disclosed this week when Northrop Aircraft announced its establishment of a new administrative and storage facility in the city.

Approximately 700 company personnel are expected to occupy the 108,000 square foot installation at 2131-33-35, Dominguez avenue on a gradual basis, beginning November 1, according to an announcement by Robert R. Miller, Northrop vice president and general manager.

Immediate need for additional working space on Northrop's Snark SM-62 intercontinental guided missile project necessitated the transfer of two major Northrop departments and supporting segments of others to the Torrance location, the Northrop executive stated.

Three 36,000 square foot building on a five-acre site comprise the new Northrop facility which the company has leased from Abraham Rochlin, West Los Angeles industrialist and developer.

Technical training and provisioning units will be quartered in two of the buildings. The third structure will continue in its present capacity as a storage warehouse for the Hawthorne airplane manufacturing firm. No manufacturing operations are planned for the facility.

In announcing Northrop's large scale entry into the Torrance industrial community, Miller said the company was pleased with the cooperation received from city officials during negotiations prior to establishment of the facility.

Northrop has always tried to be a "good neighbor," continued Miller and take an interest in the local activities of communities in which the company has installations. "We will continue this policy in Torrance," he concluded.

Northrop currently employs about 20,000 personnel at several locations throughout Southern California and the nation. Main base of operations for the company is its Hawthorne plant employing approximately 15,000.

Other Northrop installations are located in Anaheim, Palmdale, Edwards Air Force Base, El Segundo, Pasadena and Van Nuys, Calif.; Alamogordo, New Mexico; El Paso, Texas; and Cocoa, Florida.

Current Northrop projects include manufacture of Scorpion F-89H all-weather interceptors and Snark guided missiles, modernization and modification of operational Scorpions into F-89J aircraft and research and development work on a new supersonic trainer airplane.

May I request that anyone who has any information of interest to this column put all the necessary information in the Tartar Teen Talk box.


