His activities during the past few years have been largely in the Keystone area, where he resided. He was a registrar of voters and was recently appointed to serve the Torrance area on the "Senior Citizens Committee for the Election of Richard Richards to the United States Senate."

He was instrumental in the erection of the Calvary Community church, in Hammett tract, and served as its secretary-treasurer for several years.

Surviving Mr. Hill are his wife Cora; Lula Bledsoe, daughter, of Clearwater, Florida; Alvan Hill, son, former city employee and ex-member of the Torrance Planning Commission; daughters Leota Bryan and Fern Brannon of Torrance, and Vera Winterhalter of Inglewood; and son Ernest of San Mateo.

Mr. Hill also leaves two brothers, Quince and Raymond, of Kansas, together with 10 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren.


