Hospital Issue OK'd

Board of Directors of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce have indorsed the \$15,400,000 bond issue to replace vitally needed County Hospital facilities.

Sam Levy, Chairman of the Citizens Committee for Proposition B, today announced receipt of the indorsement of the Chamber of the bond issue which will benefit hospital users county-wide.

The money will be used to replace the present inadequate, old Harbor General Hospital facilities with a new 700-bed institution to care for patients in the southern portion of the county.

The Board of Supervisors announced they will follow with three more General Hospitals at strategic parts of the County.

"This new facility will lift the load from the Los Angeles General Hospital," Alfred Thomas, Director of Harbor General said. "We will take care of the entire southern portion of the County and make more beds available at the main hospital."

Support for Proposition B is coming from medical men throughout the county and various other groups have indorsed the bonds.
