

3 Delegates To Represent Harbor YW

For the first time in recent years YW members from the Harbor area will be represented at the National service launching World Fellowship week, November 11-17. Those who will attend are the three delegates to the National Y-teen conference—Judith Drake, Judy Wolf, and Sandra Davies. Marian Fat-out of the YW staff will accompany the girls.

The service will take place on Sunday, November 11, 11 a.m. in the National cathedral in Washington D.C. More than 3000 Association representatives from all parts of the country and friends of the organization will attend. Dr. Henry Pitney Van Dusen, president of Union Theological seminary of New York City, will deliver the address on the World Fellowship theme, "Christians in Action."

Choirs of the Cathedral, Howard University, and the YWCA will present a musical program at the service. A special feature will be the gift-bringing ceremony in which Y-teens, teenage members of the YWCA, will form a processional at the close of the service to present World Fellowship funds from the various states for blessing. These gifts represent contributions made by YWCAs in the United States to carry on the work of the Foreign division of the National association. The YWCA is a part of a mutual service program in which YWCAs around the world assist each other in strengthening their work.

Last year gifts enabled the Foreign division to provide work for Advisory secretaries in Associations in 13 countries abroad, aid in the form of budget grants for special projects and establish a leadership training program in which 36 women from 26 countries studied and worked in YWs here.

Bureau Helps Needy People

Catholic Welfare bureau, a Community Chest supported agency, is maintained to help people help themselves by becoming self-supporting, and maintains a service at very little cost.

Through its affiliation with a large number of institutions it is in a position to offer specialized care to people with health, legal and family problems.

The Catholic Welfare bureau gives casework service and financial assistance to Catholic families but applicants are accepted regardless of race, color, or creed in areas where there is no other private agency available.

Financial assistance is limited to those who are ineligible for help from public tax-supported agencies, thus avoiding duplication. Many people have no resource but to accept aid from a private welfare agency such as the bureau.

Success of the Bureau's program is made possible through gifts to the Community Chest, which is currently striving to meet a goal of \$10,000 in the Los Angeles area for support of 168 Red Feather welfare agencies.

MENTAL HEALTH DISCUSSED AT PTA

"Mental Health Services," a discussion by Mrs. C. B. Walsworth, highlighted the regular Meadow Park PTA meeting, October 22. She told of the work being done by the group and how it tied in with the home, school, and other groups.

She explained that the service was available for every one in need of help along these lines and stressed the importance of recognizing early any mental disturbance.

"It was found by the Mental Health Services that so often it was the parents that were in need of help and not the children who were sent to the clinic," she said.

The meeting was called to order by president Mrs. J. T. Anagnost and the flag ceremony by Brownie troop 503. Mrs. E. C. Terry gave the inspirational message for the evening.
