### Beach Cities Symphony To Present Concert Friday

On Friday, December 7, the Beach Cities Symphony association will present a concert at the Torrance high school auditorium at 8:30 p.m. with Louis Palange conducting.

Mr. Palange, who is also a composer and instrumentalist, has assembled approximately 60 professional and skilled amateur musicians from the South Bay area for the performance. Proceeds will go to the City of Hope, Duarte, California.

The varied program will feature guest soloist, Dale Reubart, performing Edward Grieg's "Piano Concerto in A Minor." Mr. Reubart, Torrance, is a native of Kansas where he has appeared with the Kansas City Philharmonic. He received his

Doctor of Music from the University of Southern California and is now on the music faculty of USC. His most recent public appearance was with the Beach Cities symphony in September and a recital in Hancock auditorium in November.

Other selections, carefully and appropriately selected, include "Victory at Sea" by Richard Rodgers, "Prelude and Love Death" from "Tristan and Isolde" by Richard Wagner, "The Nutcracker Suite," by Peter Tchaikovsky, and Dimitri Kabelevsky's "Gallop" from "The Comedians."

#### REAL ESTATE TAXES

If you are a property owner you have no doubt received your tax statement covering real estate taxes you will be required to pay in 1956. The due and delinquent dates should not be forgotten. The first installment is due November 1st and payment becomes delinquent December 10th. A 6% penalty applies to all delinquent tax. To some the tax paying period is a painful one since no provision has been made during the year for the tax to be paid and as a result sufficient funds are not on hand to meet the first installment. A program which has considerable merit is practiced by government agencies with a guarantee or insure mortgage loans on homes. Borrowers who avail themselves of this type of loan are required to pay one-twelfth of the estimated or established taxes to the lending institution holding the loan, and a reserve is accumulated for the purpose of meeting tax payments levied. Under this plan payment of taxes is no burden as the tax load is distributed over the year, and lump sum payments are eliminated. This same program can be followed by anyone owning real property and its adoption is highly recommended. A sound procedure in accomplishing this purpose is to start a savings account in our bank with one-twelfth of the amount you are required to pay and to continue monthly deposits thereafter. By so doing you will have no future concern regarding tax payments. Compare the plan with your income tax withholding and you have the answer. We will be glad to discuss detail relating to the saving-reserve method with you and we will also give consideration to applications for loans to cover the first installment or total of 1956 taxes to be paid. 
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

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
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### HOLIDAY CONCERT SLATED
