POST OFFICE: Councilman Jahn said that he has heard several "rumors" that the Torrance Post Office is to become a central distributing one for the area. The council acted to inform government officials of local facilities (such as the airport) and also asked for added postal facilities to cope with the local growth problem.

OLD CITY HALL: George Finder, major downtown Torrance property holder, offered \$100,000 for the old city hall, using the church property at El Prado near Cabrillo as partial trade in. The council declined the offer until they knew more about it.

SERVICES: Mayor Albert Isen asked City Attorney Stanley Remelmeier for an opinion whether a chartered city may render municipal services to other incorporated cities similar to what the county does (as in the case of the Lakewood plan).

CIVIC GROUP: North Torrance Civic Improvement association, by a unanimous vote, went on record as follows: "That the North Torrance Civic Improvement association stands solidly behind the city of Torrance and the governing body of the city of Torrance. the total project cost of about \$2,400,000.

Petitions Circulated. Petitions seeking establishment of the hospital district, with the city limits of Torrance as boundaries, are now being circulated. Signatures of 15 percent of the total of Torrance voters who voted in the last gubernatorial election are necessary to create the district.

Gerald L. Revell, president of Cal-Metal corp. industry chairman of the campaign, urged the industrial firms to give immediately for the voluntary, tax-free hospital.

"Unless we support this campaign," he said, "we are going to face an inequitable and disproportionate tax burden for many years to come. This is the time to make sure we will have no district hospital, and the one way to make sure is to see that the voluntary hospital is built."

R. R. Parkin, of Doak Aircraft co., who is chairman of the Torrance Industries Tax Committee, told the gathering that 20 members of his committee met last week and determined that unified action of industry to support the tax-free hospital and defeat the district effort is a "must" for every industry in the area.

"We must let the Board of Supervisors know that this voluntary hospital is on the way," he declared, "and that industry is going to assure the success of this campaign."

The industry committee will hold another meeting to discuss specific gifts at breakfast January 17 at the Wayfarers restaurant in Lomita, one day after the Boundary Commission meeting in Los Angeles.
