**FOUND GUILTY:** Robert Arthur Bassett, 24, of Lomita was sentenced to serve the term prescribed by law at the Chino State prison following manslaughter and gross neglect charges brought against him in the death of Gardena Police Reserve Officer Eugene Donald Bacon. Bacon was killed at Compton and Western Ave., September 1, when Bassett's car ran into the rear of the police car.
