Questions to be considered include:

- How is the educational objective best accomplished?
- How do we know that a child is challenged to the fullest?
- How can we see to it that the progress report, which may be a perfect tool, is used properly by parents and teachers?
- Will it be possible for the letter-grade system (high school, college) and the non-grade system (elementary school) to co-exist?
- Should the emphasis fall on being best in the class or doing the best work of which the individual is capable?

Saturdays, except for deliveries of special delivery mail.

Effective April 29, no third class mail matter will be accepted for mailing, except for medicines, serums, drugs and medical supplies.

Effective April 15, window service at the main post office and all classified and contract stations will be restricted to 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Mondays through Fridays.

Money order sales will be restricted to the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. Money order sales will be suspended altogether effective April 29.

Spokesmen for 13 postal employe organizations called at the White House to pledge their support of Summerfield, who asked for \$47,000,000 to tide the department over the remaining three months of the fiscal year. The house committee so far has voted only \$17,000,000. It is expected to decide on the remaining \$30,000,000 this Friday.

15 cents (per \$100) would raise about \$195,000 for the development and operation of parks and playgrounds.

3) Either, A service charge of 75 cents per month for each dwelling unit for complete refuse collection, with a sliding scale charge for commercial and industrial accounts, yielding an estimated revenue of \$245,000 per year.

Or, Instead of the service charge, a 15 cents tax rate (per \$100) for collection and disposal of refuse, yielding about \$195,000.

Stevens believes that the tax rate could be lowered again in a year or two, "as the city's growth levels off and there is a substantial increase in revenues from our commercial and industrial developments."

He pointed out that it is up to the council to act on this matter. If the issue were placed on the ballot the money would not be available for the
