the building with a gun in his hand. When Long Beach police arrived, the two men had hidden behind a cabinet in the rear of the building. A window of the station had been forced open and an attempt had been made to blow open the floor safe with an explosive. A large quantity of burglar tools and a German luger type pistol were found inside. Two pry bars, a tire iron, a cold chisel, an icepick, a ballpeen hammer, and a large sledge hammer, both broken at the handle, were found on the floor near the safe. After the men were arrested, a luger-type pistol was found on a metal cabinet at the rear of the building. Both men disclaimed knowledge of the gun or how it got there.

A small cash register had been removed from the front of the building and forced open on the floor of the rear room. It contained no money.

Both men refused to discuss the burglary, but Hall told officers that he was out on bail on an armed robbery charge.

**Three Local Students Win Bank Contest**

Twelve local high school seniors were named Zone 7 winners last week in Bank of America's annual statewide Achievement Awards program. Four of them, all first place winners in their categories, will receive cash awards from \$100 to \$1,000 each when they compete in the Southern California finals May 15, at Statler Hotel, Los Angeles. The four second place winners each received awards of \$50 Thursday, and third place winners \$25 each.

Richard Bentwood, Torrance High school, won first place in the liberal arts division; June Nakawatase, North High school, won second place in science and mathematics; and Barbara Carter, Torrance High school, won third place in vocational arts.

Winners were picked by a judging panel of civic leaders, who met the 36 competing students at the Long Beach City College, Long Beach, to hear them in group discussions of topics related to their studies. Zone 7 includes the high schools of southeast Los Angeles County.

The students had already won certificates, gold trophies, and the honor of representing their schools. Scoring was based on grades, leadership and outside activities, and the group discussions.

The same system will be used in the finals May 15, when first place winners from all nine zones of Southern California appear. Their cash awards will be presented that evening at a banquet attended by 600 honor students, parents, educators, and prominent citizens. They will represent schools from all over the southland, except those of the Los Angeles City Schools system, which form a separate division whose finals will be held May 9 at the Statler.

(Continued from Page 1) of tests is as accurate as is humanly possible, he said. The tests are given two months after the beginning of the fall term. On the basis of these tests, a teacher can see whether a pupil is a slow, average, or fast learner and whether he is working to his full potential. The tests, he pointed out, help to judge a pupil on an individual basis. The conference system of reporting can tell parents more, therefore, than a straight letter grade would, it was pointed out. Since grades are required in high school and college, the committee is trying to decide whether seventh and eighth graders should switch over to the letter grade system and whether those grades should be based on actual achievement of potential ability.
