Disabled Vets Urged to See Social Security Office Here

Totally disabled veterans—regardless of any compensation or pension they are receiving—should stop at the local Social Security office before June 30, Mrs. Sara R. Evans, director, Torrance Center, stated, and make sure any disability which prevents them from earning a living is on record there. She explained that June 30 is the expiration date of an important provision of the "disability freeze" which protects the benefits of persons with impaired earning power.

SUMMER SESSION SCHEDULE TOLD

The Torrance Unified School district summer session will begin on June 24 for a period of six weeks. It is estimated that the elementary schools will enroll 3,500 summer session students. North High school anticipates an enrollment of 257, and Torrance High school expects 255 students to attend.

Subjects to be offered at North High school and Torrance High school will include English, driver education, mathematics, social studies, typing, and science.

The elementary summer school program will be a continuation of the regular school program, offering students an opportunity to work under the guidance of a trained teacher. Fifty per cent of the time will be devoted to the regular academic subjects. Children will be given additional help in subjects where they have been experiencing difficulty, and students with exceptional abilities will have an opportunity to work on specific interests.
