Teachers Sought by LA City

An intensive drive to hire teachers for substitute work in the harbor and southern area of Los Angeles is being conducted by the Los Angeles City Schools Personnel division, according to Associate Superintendent William B. Brown.

Despite the September opening of two new elementary schools and one high school in the southern area, the personnel division anticipates the recruitment of enough teachers to staff the area's 90 schools—with one major exception, substitute teachers for all grades in both elementary and junior and senior high schools.

Both long term and short term assignments are available to those who can qualify. An applicant must hold a bachelor's degree, must not have reached his 55th birthday, and must have six semester hours in professional education courses by September of this year.

"A substitute teaching position is ideal for the qualified mother who can be absent from her family duties only a part of the week," Brown said. He further stressed that the beginning substitute salary of \$450 will be the same as a beginning teacher's salary.

All applicants are advised to obtain a copy of college transcripts and must be able to verify age and citizenship. A birth certificate is preferred.
