Local Indian Tribes to Hit Trail in Chippewa Pow-Wow

Local youngsters will be whooping it up when they participate in the Chippewa Pow Wow day camp being sponsored by the Torrance Recreation department.

Boys and girls will learn to build fires and cook on a camp fire, and while the scent of wood smoke and out door cooking fills the air, there will be crafts, group singing and other activities to keep them busy. The program currently in session is being held at El Retiro park and will continue through August 9. The last day camp is scheduled for August 13 through 16 at Torrance park. The day camp will be in session Tuesday through Friday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Campers are accepted on a first-come-first served basis with a maximum of 45 campers per session. They must be between the ages of 7 and 12 years of age. The registration fee for 4 days at camp is \$4. This charge covers the cost of cook-outs, bus for field trip, craft supplies, and leadership.

Application may be made by procuring an application blank at the local park or playground or at the Torrance Recreation department office. Take the application and \$4 to the Torrance Recreation department, 3031 Torrance Blvd. or else call FA. 8-4108.

Some of the many activities available to the campers include hiking, cook-outs, field trips and camp skills. Emphasis is placed on basic camp craft skills and progression of simple cooking skills.

Craft articles that will be made include Lemmy Sticks (the Indians used them for use in singing and rhythms; sit-ups (the Indians used them as mats) and Indian bracelets out of aluminum and lanyard materials; and name tags out of bark and alphabet soup.

Some of the camping skills that will be taught in this day camp include the use of an axe and knife; how to roll up sleeping bags; basic first aid and knot tying.

There are also scheduled as extra activities: singing, folk-dancing, games, a treasure hunt, and a hat contest. The types of songs that will be sung are the old camp fire variety, rounds and those just for fun.

The directors are Herman Goodman, Janet Myren and Mae Stadler. Herman Goodman is well qualified in this area, having had three years of experience in the Infantry as a scout and having served for 10 years as a scoutmaster. Janet Myren and Mae Stadler also have a background appropriate to this type of leadership which includes working with Campfire Girls and other related recreational experience.
