**Voters Must Register by September 5**

Torrance residents were warned by Chamber of Commerce president A. E. Thompson that September 5 is the deadline for registration for voting in the special city election on October 29.  
 Thompson said residents must be registered at least 54 days before the election which will include (1) a \$3,000,000 Park Bond Issue (2) a \$1,000,000 Airport Bond Issue.  
 Also are Charter Amendments providing method of Airport Bond payment and the election of a seven man City Council. The latter includes that the mayor be elected separately.  
 Those who have moved since the last general election or who did not vote in the last general election may register at the City Clerks Office in the Civic Center or at any certified Registrar.

 New students at Torrance High school, 2200 Carson st., and North High school, 3620 W. 182nd st., will report to the counseling offices in the main buildings of each school.  
 Enrollment of new South High school students will be conducted in Room No. 5 of the Torrance Elementary school, 2005 Martina ave.  
 It is requested that one or both parents accompany the new student to the school to aid in the selection of the student's program of classes. Parents are also asked to bring any records from former schools that may be of assistance in the programming of their children.  
 High school students who attended an elementary school or a high school in Torrance last year will not need to register since their enrollment was completed in June, 1957.

 All students who will be ninth and tenth graders in September, 1957, and who live in the following elementary school attendance areas: Anza, Hillside, Meadow Park, Newton, Parkway, Riviera, Seaside, Sepulveda, and Watteria.  
**Torrance High School**  
 All students in grades 9 through 12 who live in the following elementary school attendance areas: Fern-Greenwood, Madrona, Torrance Elementary and Wood.  
 All students who will be twelfth graders in September, 1957, and who live in the following elementary attendance areas: Hillside, Meadow Park (except those students north of Sepulveda Blvd.), Newton, Parkway, Riviera, Seaside, and Watteria.

 "There is grave danger that many otherwise well-intentioned citizens will become the unwitting tools of these professional opponents of self-government unless they check carefully the real source of any information presented to them about incorporation," Chandler concluded.
