\$203,479 Is Low Bid On Alondra Park Project

Apparent low bid for major improvements in the south portion of Alondra park, including a new bathroom, has been submitted by the Walter Schrein Construction Co., Supervisor Kenneth Hahn announced last week following opening of bids. Ten bids were received, ranging from the apparent low of \$203,479 to a high of \$235,000. All bids are now being analyzed and it is expected that the county engineer will submit his recommendation for award of the construction contract within two weeks, Hahn stated. He pointed out that this is the third major project for Alondra park in the past two years in accordance with the program to develop the park and playground into one of the finest regional recreational centers in the southwest section of the county.

PLAN PLAY AREAS
In addition to the bathroom of 1500 square feet, the project includes construction of a large play area for children, picnic areas, beach sand areas, walks around the western portion of the lake, park lighting, landscaping, walls and fencing. Plans also call for construction of a new comfort station to serve the picnic shelter and area completed last spring. Hahn said that another important part of the improvement will be the development of additional parking along Redondo Beach boulevard.

She is a 19-year-old liberal arts major and is a member of the newly formed El Camettes dance-drill team. She plans attendance at UCLA and an eventual career in photography.
