

Employment Drops 11,000 In State

California manufacturing employment dropped by nearly 11,000 last month, but was at the highest September level on record, Ernest B. Webb, California Director of Industrial Relations, announced this week.

Factory employment totaled 1,293,000 in September compared with 1,303,800 in August. The decrease of 10,800 was the largest August-September decline in five years. More than half of the drop represented cutbacks at aircraft plants. Most of the balance came from seasonal layoffs in canning, automobiles, and lumber.

Aircraft employment declined for the fifth consecutive month, and at 267,300 in September was down by about 18,000, or six per cent, from the postwar high established in April.

Manufacturing employment in September was 25,000 higher than a year ago, but this was the smallest year-to-year spread since January 1955.

Expansion in electronics has made the electrical equipment group the fastest growing manufacturing industry in the State. In the past 12 months, nearly 14,000 additional jobs were created in this industry. This accounts for more than half the growth in total manufacturing employment since September 1956.

Manufacturing employment in the Los Angeles-Long Beach Metropolitan Area dropped by nearly 9,000 in September to the lowest level in the past 11 months, it was also reported.

Swiss Air Force Shops at Douglas

Seven members of a Swiss Air Defense delegation conferred with Douglas Aircraft Company officials in El Segundo on the proposed purchase of A4D Skyhawk atom bombers for the Swiss Air Force, it was announced last week.

The group was headed by General Etienne Primault, chief of the Swiss Air Force. Simultaneously, Swiss pilots were scheduled to make evaluation flights of the midget jet attack plane at the Naval Air Test Center, Patuxent River, Md.

The visit to the El Segundo plant of Douglas was part of a Swiss purchasing mission to various United States aircraft manufacturers. Host during the delegation's local inspection tour was Douglas president, Donald W. Douglas.

The A4D is a carrier based attack bomber currently in operation with the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps. Simple and compact in design, it can carry the atomic bomb as well as guided missiles. The Skyhawk holds the world speed record for the 500 km. closed course of 695.163 miles per hour.

Solicitation for the 1957-58 Community Chest among Torrance small businesses got under way with a kick-off breakfast last week for 23 campaigners, J. H. Paget, Torrance Business Chairman for the campaign announced.

At the kick-off in Huff's Restaurant, Paget gave his committee assignments and some instruction. "The goal for this year's campaign is \$10,300,000, nine per cent higher than last year's," he told them. "Everyone will have to give that much more than last year in order for the goal to be met."

Harbor Schools Seek Part-Time Teachers

An intensive recruitment campaign for both regular and part-time teachers for Harbor Schools will begin this week throughout the area, it was announced by Associate Superintendent William B. Brown, Chief of the city school's Personnel Division.

A representative of the Los Angeles City Schools has been assigned to the Harbor area to give teacher examinations. These examinations will be given at Harbor Junior College, 1111 Figueroa Place, Wilmington on October 26 and November 2, at 9 a.m.

Ross Hancock, principal of Hawaiian Avenue School in Wilmington will conduct the Harbor program. Both long term and short term assignments—as a regular teacher or for day-to-day substitute work—are available for those who can qualify. An applicant must hold a bachelor's degree including six semester hours in professional education. They must have reached their 19th birthday and must not have reached their 66th birthday. They do not need to hold a California teacher's credential.

"Substitute teaching positions are ideal for housewives and other persons who can be absent from their duties for only part of the week," Brown stated. He further stressed that the substitute salaries will range from \$22.50 to \$29.45 per day. The presently adopted salary schedule for Los Angeles teachers calls for a minimum of \$4500 and a maximum of \$8250 for a ten-month school year.

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450 Vets Enroll in Harbor College

Veteran enrollment at Harbor Junior College is continuing at a high level during the current semester, Robert V. Bacon, Veterans' Counselor, said today.

Of the 450 veterans attending Harbor, representing more than 14 per cent of the student body, 155 are enrolled in day classes and 295 in extended-day sessions. Eight of the enrollees are women. The greatest number are majoring in engineering and police science.
