"December is the most dangerous month of the year," an Auto Club spokesman stated. "People have a lot to think about and their attention is easily diverted from their driving."


"A great number of the accidents at this time of the year result from lack of concentration," he pointed out. "Drivers

are apt to be absorbed in getting Christmas shopping chores over, planning holiday festivities, and enjoying other pleasures of the season, so that they just don't give their full attention to the job behind the wheel."

"The most dangerous days are those immediately preceding and following Christmas. Saturday and Sunday are heavy accident days, and the most hazardous hours are 5 and 6 p.m. "Strange as it may seem, most of these tragic accidents occur under ideal driving conditions, in clear weather and on dry pavement," he said.






