Freeway Traffic Pattern Through Carson Arranged

County Road Commissioner Sam R. Kennedy has been notified the Carson Civic Betterment Association that Proposal No. 1, which concentrates on and off ramps of the Harbor Freeway at 220 and Figueroa streets has been selected as the best proposal for handling of vehicular and pedestrian traffic. Many proposals have been submitted and studied by the County Road Department and the State Division of Highways in regards to construction of the Harbor Freeway through Carson.

At present the plans are for on and off ramps for south bound traffic to be at Carson and at 223 streets. A divider strip is to be constructed in Figueroa st. at 220 st. to prevent 220 st. from being used for north bound traffic entrance and exit to the freeway. Figueroa st. will be channeled at 220 st. to allow right and left hand turns to and from the freeway.

Kennedy has promised further conferences with the Carson Civic Betterment Association to discuss pedestrian traffic and safety along Figueroa st. near the Stephen M. White Junior High School. Still under study is a pedestrian crosswalk, either over or under the Harbor Freeway at 220 st. Also under study is a certain amount of side walk construction at 220 and Figueroa streets.

Additional information will probably be released at the next meeting of the Carson association on Tuesday, January 14.

TIMELY ACTION
Sometimes police officers are at the right place at the right time. One of those occasions was last Saturday night when a sheriff patrol car, cruising along Figueroa st. near 235 st. smelled smoke. Officers determined the smoke was coming from a garage at 613 W. 235 st. The sheriff officers located the owner of the house, Mack Young. When the garage door was opened they found Young's 1957 two-door sedan on fire. The officers helped push the auto out in the street, and called the Los Angeles County Fire Department on Carson Street.

By the time the fire department arrived and put out the fire, the car was almost a total loss but the timely action of the sheriff patrol prevented Young's garage from catching on fire.

ON FURLOUGH
Charles Rettig of 113 E. 216 st., who is now with the First Reconnaissance Battalion, 1st Marine Division at Camp Pendleton, is home on a weeks' furlough. Charles attended Banning High School before he went into service almost two years ago.

When he returns to camp he will be sent out for a three-weeks stay at Pickle Meadows, near Bridgeport, California, for cold weather training. Rettig has not had any foreign service, and he does not expect to have any as his two-years enlistment will be up in July 1958.

He expects to return to school at Banning High and finish his high school course when he is discharged.

A statistical survey of local employment conditions, compiled under the direction of the chamber's research department, revealed this area's total civilian labor force rose from 2,554,000 in October, 1956, to 2,615,200 in October, 1957.

According to James S. Cantien, chairman of the chamber's research committee, while total employment was up slightly—2.4 per cent—compared to October last year, the gain is nullified when considered in terms of population gain during the past 12 months.

"Sharp declines were registered in manufacturing, with 11,100 fewer people employed than a year ago," said Cantien. "The only significant gains shown in manufacturing during the past year were in the electrical machinery field—consisting primarily of electronics—with 6800 additional employes, and auto assembly and parts with 2800 new workers."

Cantien said the most serious declines were noted in aircraft and parts, off 10,900; furniture and fixtures, off 1900; food and food products, off 4200; and ordinance, off 1900.

Cantien indicated that finance, insurance and real estate also showed strong gains with 5300 new employes. Gains of equal importance were made in the service trades which accounted for the employment of 14,000 new people in October, 1957.

"The most startling gains were made in the field of government employment," Cantien declared. "Wage and salary workers in government increased by 16,000 over last year."

The chamber spokesman noted this as a significant factor to substantiate arguments that the rise in local taxes can be attributed to increased budgets for expanded government services and operations.

"During 1949," he continued, "Metropolitan Los Angeles' total government employment, at all levels, equalled 172,900. Currently there are more people employed in this area by state and local governments alone—over 200,000—than there were by all three levels of government combined seven years ago.

Rx for Good Health

Preventive medicine is the positive approach to good health, yet many parents through lack of information, carelessness or personal foibles fail to give their children the protection of immunization.

Good health through immunization can be attained. Today, such diseases as diphtheria, smallpox, typhoid fever, whooping cough, and scarlet fever have been greatly reduced in severity or almost eradicated.

Immunizations and inoculations against disease have become a by-word in every household. Why, then, do some parents fail to give their children this protection? The diseases are still with us, since their causative bacteria are always lurking about, waiting for the opportunity to settle and breed.

Smallpox, for example, is a serious disease and highly contagious. There is no known specific treatment for smallpox, but vaccination will prevent it. Because the length of protection afforded by a smallpox vaccination is not known, a revaccination every five to seven years is recommended. Because this practice is not consistently carried out, sporadic cases of the disease appear occasionally.

Diphtheria is another serious communicable disease that can be prevented through inoculation. Infants should be given toxoid injections during the first year of life and periodic "booster" inoculations later.

Whooping cough can still take the lives of infant. Immunization should be started within the first few months of life. This injection too should be followed by subsequent "booster" shots. Your physician has another protective device against whooping cough. Should the disease develop, hyper-immune blood plasma or serum can be administered, which creates a "passive immunity." If given early in the course of the disease, or soon after exposure, the illness of the victim may be modified. This is only a temporary protection, however.

Tetanus, or lockjaw, is another disease for which there is almost foolproof protection. The germs of tetanus are found in the soil almost everywhere, and children especially are therefore exposed. Minor cuts, burns and scratches should be viewed with suspicion. Let your physician decide the need for protection against tetanus.

These are a few of the conditions that can be controlled through immunization. Today's children are the adult population of tomorrow. Your contribution toward promoting a healthier nation can be achieved by giving your child protection against disease—through immunization.
