"Strength Through Cooperation," was the theme of the January 9 Association meeting of the Howard Wood P.T.A.

The special services available to the area were discussed by Mrs. Jane Robinson, a psychologist of the Southwest School District Cooperative Special Education program. Mrs. Margie Bell Brown, Psychologist of the Torrance Unified School District and Thomas Lasecki, a Speech Therapist, who is at Howard Wood school.

Mrs. Robinson showed slides on the various programs—Cerebral Palsy, Orthopedic and Deaf, Braille, Partially Sighted, Deaf and Hard of Hearing and the Mentally Handicapped. Though no provision is made in the Educational Program for a Handicapped child the South-west School Districts which include Inglewood, Hawthorne, Lawndale, Lennox and Torrance attempt to include all children who need the services. The state and school district of residence share the expenses.

Mrs. Brown defined the term, Point One and Point Two Program as children who in Group One are educable and Group Two are trainable.

Lasecki expressed the need for teachers in special services and told of the funds available through P.T.A. This is made possible by the Honorary Life Memberships purchased in a recipients name by local units.

The Nominating Committee was elected by the group and includes Mmes. Darna Houston, Ivan Ekersley, H. D. Walsh, Robert O' Cain and R. D. Evans, principal.
