El Camino Physics Instructor Named L. A. School Consultant

New honors were accorded Julius S. Miller this week as the El Camino College physics instructor was appointed consultant and in physics by the Los Angeles City Schools.

Further recognition in the scientific leadership of the college instructor was made by the Beverly Hills schools, which have engaged Miller to setup, organize, coordinate, and preside at a series of lectures to be called "Science for the Citizen."

The series of eight lectures will be presented by renowned physicist Julius S. Miller. The purpose is to enlighten and inform the citizenry on the frontiers of scientific achievement in various fields, the lecture prospectus outlines.

The lectures will be conducted in the Beverly Hills High School Auditorium at 7:30 p.m. on eight Monday evenings, March 3, 10, 17, 24, and April 7, 14, 21, and 28.

Miller, who, in addition to his position on the El Camino faculty, is an associate research physicist at the University of California at Los Angeles, has announced that the fields of medicine, physics, radiation, space flight, and astronomy will be included in the coordinated program which he is preparing.

As physics consultant to the Los Angeles schools, Miller's immediate function will be to present a series of eight lectures on physics demonstrations at UCLA. Scheduled dates for the

Marines Say: Enlist Now, Serve Later

The U.S. Marine Corps will accept an unlimited number of enlistments in January and February, according to information received by Master Sergeant John Dolly, local Marine recruiter.

Still open to young men of this area is the delay-type program whereby an applicant can enlist now and delay up to 120 days before reporting for active duty and recruit training.

A limited number of openings will also be available to qualified young men who are interested in serving in Marine Corps aviation. These aviation openings are guaranteed to selected applicants before enlistment.

The delay enlistment is also open to young women and, as with men, there is no limit to the number of young women who may be enlisted in the Women's Marine Corps during January and February.

Sergeant Dolly said that he has complete information on all Marine Corps programs and will welcome any inquiries from interested young men and women of the Torrance area. This information, he added, is also available to college students and recent graduates who are interested in obtaining a commission.

Classes for 4-year Olds Begin Feb. 3

Torrance Evening High School is opening a new unique child observation class for parents and their children. This class is limited to four-year-olds who will be eligible for kindergarten in September, 1958, and will be geared toward preparing children for kindergarten. The class will be held in two locations from 12:30 to 3:30 p.m. at McMaster Park, 3624 W. 174th St. at Yukon on Tuesdays, and El Retiro Park, 126 Vista del Parque (Hollywood Riviera) on Wednesdays.

Children will have opportunities for creative experiences and supervised play with others their own age. Parents will observe activities and learn an objective approach to child observation. Discussion of problems related to child-rearing will be carried on under a well-trained teacher qualified to assist in their solution.

Written reports will be kept during the afternoon, noting the child's actions and reactions in his relationship with other children and adults in the class.

During the discussion period, growth and development as well as specific problems on personal health habits, feeding, sleeping, discipline, sibling rivalry, suitable toys, play activity, etc., will be discussed at length. This observation will show many of the ways children grow, learn to share, and conform to routines. They will learn among other things, words that work with young children, and better, simpler methods of control.

Each child is to bring a share toy, a blanket to rest on and an apron. On the day of the class each parent is urged to provide a quiet morning period preferably with little stimulation, and a long rest period in order that the youngster will not become over-tired by the afternoon's activities.

The classes are designed specifically for the four-year old. Other pre-schoolers, ages 2 1/2 to kindergarten, have a number

class at 9 a.m. at the same parks on the same days.

Edison Meters Set New Mark

Southern California Edison Company has passed the 1,500,000 mark in installed electric meters, it was announced today by G. L. Blanchard, district manager.

In calling attention to the milestone, Mr. Blanchard noted that the Edison Company has been in a period of record expansion to provide electrical service for the huge numbers of new residents, businesses and industrial plants coming in to Central and Southern California.

"It was just seven years ago—in April, 1951—that we added our millionth meter to the system," he said. "This means that approximately a million and a half people have moved into our service territory since then."

In contrast to that spectacular growth, it took from 1896, when the company was incorporated under its present name, to 1938—42 years—to pass the half million mark in meters, and 13 years, from 1938 to 1951, to reach a million.

The Dentist Says:

Bleeding Gums Cause Loss of Teeth

"The gums around my lower front teeth bleed very easily. How can this condition be cured?" asks Mrs. R. K. of Lomita.

Bleeding of the gums around the teeth might be caused by either of two things—tartar accumulation irritating the gums or excessive pressure caused by chewing mainly towards the front of the mouth.

Where the back teeth are missing and not replaced, the two jaws will come closer together than they should so that the upper front teeth come down over the lower more than they did before. Overlapping creates pressure, resulting in strain on the teeth and damage to the bony support, which in turn is accompanied by inflammation and congestion of the gums. Then, the gums bleed easily.

So you can see that bleeding of the gums around the front teeth often comes as a result of missing teeth in the back of the mouth. This is also aggravated by tartar accumulations on the inside surfaces of the teeth.

If these conditions are not corrected, the over-erected teeth will be endangered. Of course, there are other causes for bleeding gums but the two above are among the most prominent.
