What can we do to help straighten them out before they become involved.

FROM POLICE DEPARTMENT, CITY OF TORRANCE JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

Juvenile Delinquency. Who is a juvenile delinquent? Take the word delinquency, attach that to any boy or girl under the age of eighteen and they are juvenile delinquents. They could be delinquent as far as their health habits, delinquent in going to school. They could be delinquent in a number of ways and still could be called juvenile delinquents. The juvenile that is found guilty of repeatedly violating the law, is what we of the Juvenile Bureau call a juvenile delinquent. I have received a large number of complaints from the citizens of Torrance, and a great number of the complaints have referred to their neighbors children or the children of whom they are complaining, as juvenile delinquents for committing minor infractions of what can actually be construed as violating of the peace and quiet of the neighborhood. These boys and girls are not juvenile delinquents. They haven't repeatedly violated the law. Their health habits are good. In many instances these same boys and girls are B and A students in school. Still they are called juvenile delinquents.

I have watched the faces of our young people. Watched the expression change to bitterness when these two words, juvenile delinquents, are used. They resent it, and rightfully so. Would you call your boy or your girl a delinquent, for getting in a fight with the kid next door, or going for a joy ride with a group of his friends, or for kicking over a garbage can. There are people that would stop and look back upon their childhood days and be fairminded and reminisce about the things that he or she did. I am sure that they would be more tolerant of some of our young people today.

Delinquency stems from multiple causation. No one certain thing causes juvenile delinquency. It is a number of things stored up in a boy or girl over a period of time, causing delinquency. The people who work with the delinquent boy or girl are fast to realize that no two cases are alike. We must realize that these cases must be investigated and handled properly. We must try to correct the problems that have caused his deviant behavior. We need manpower and the facilities to do this. We must recognize that we have the true juvenile delinquent in the boy or girl who repeatedly violates the laws of our society. If they are not corrected now, they become the criminals of tomorrow. Therefore when we use the phrase juvenile delinquent, we must make sure that we are using it correctly. That we are giving these boys and girls the right name.

YOUTH AND RELIGION

When we look at the delinquencies and excesses of young people today, an adult is tempted to say, self-righteously, something like this: "It's terrible. It was never like this in my day. Why, I never even dreamt of behaving the way they do. I don't know how they can be so wickedly self-centered." It is true that statistics show an alarming yearly increase in juvenile crime. Last year over 42% of all major crimes were committed by young people. 46% of this group were under eighteen years of age.
