

## Sports Site to Be Cleared by Sale

Public auction sale of buildings to be removed from the north side of Santa Barbara avenue between Figueroa street and Menlo avenue to clear the way for construction of the new Sports Auditorium. In Exposition park will be held tomorrow afternoon beginning at 1 p.m. Supervisor Kenneth Hahn announced today.

Bids for construction of the new Sports Auditorium will be opened on March 12.

Sale and removal of the buildings on this property will immediately be followed by clearing and improving the land. This will provide much needed additional parking spaces.

Buildings to be sold at the auction will be open for public inspection today and tomorrow morning, Hahn stated.

Acquisition of the property was initiated in 1955 when Hahn served as president of the collusion Commission. At that time Hahn revived the plan to construct the Sports Auditorium, which had previously been postponed three times, and appeared before the State Legislature in Sacramento. As a result of his presentation, bills were passed for construction of the Sports Auditorium and the Legislature agreed to provided \$2.5 million to the 6th Agricultural District on a loan basis for the additional parking needed to serve the new project.

Supervisor Hahn said that the present schedule of the 6th Agricultural District calls for the new parking areas to be completed and ready for use by this fall.

## BUSY WEEK-END FOR CASABANS

On the road for their past three conference conflicts, El Camino College Warriors will hit the asphalt again this week-end, doing battle in Long Beach tomorrow night, then heading East L. A.-ward Saturday.

Confident that they will return to the winning ways which they demonstrated until ineligibility and inexperience overtook them at this time in 1957, the El Cams face two teams which have already taken decisions in the season's play.

Long Beach, a perennial winner against the Warriors, has nabbed 18 wins in past games, El Camino claiming only 4 victories since conference play was initiated in 1946. In the first round opener on the ECC courts a month ago, the Vikings waxed the Warriors 87-61, despite a strong El Camino half-time lead.

The locals, working without the services of a single returning letterman, have shown improvement since the season opener, though dropping most of their conflicts to date. Coach George Stanich is optimistic that second-round play will show a revitalized Warrior Squad and predicts at least four wins

before the conference records are tabulated.

Stanich has juggled his starting line-up throughout the season, but is expected to start Mike Bright and John Spohrer at the forward spots, Kelly Kapen at center, and George Hale and Bob Hutton at the guard positions.

Long Beach, featuring the high-scoring play of Center Dick Markowitz, will probably start Dan Ayala and Bob Berry as guards and Dave Jones and Bill Jordan as forwards along with the 6 foot 4 1/2 inch Markowitz.

Heading the scoring parade for the Huskies of East L. A. to date are Eliseo Nino, a stand-out on the 1957 squad; and Art Jenkins, and Ray Thorton.

The Warriors hope to gain revenge for the 67-58 defeat pinned on them by East L. A. during the first round. Both teams have inhabited the
