Put Your Best Foot Forward

Are you listening?

Listening to what? To footfalls and personalities! Come with me in imagination, and let's play "detective." We are going to pretend that we must interview women of all ages.

And, while we wait behind the door, we LISTEN to the applicants walk down the long, marble-floored hall, and we try to guess by their footsteps what they will be like!

To know how you appear to others is somewhat like trying to find out what you look like while napping, but not quite. This may help you to diagnose your own footfalls; or get a fellow-student, friend, or neighbor to help you in this useful little game.

We hear our first applicant approaching. A loud "clap-clap-clap" assails our ears, and we automatically expect a heaving gal with her head jutting forward, jaw set, and hips protruding. Definitely the "bossy" type, we think to ourselves, before we even see her. You see, we were prejudiced by the first impression her "trot" has made. We might say she was a member of the "horsey walk" set, for lack of a better description for this type of gait.

To find out if YOU are a "clopper," listen to the sound you make on a hard surface. Also, look at your shoes. They will be unworn at the tips of the soles, while you will be constantly troubled with run-down heels. (Ill-fitting shoes, of course, can be part of the trouble too! Try nonslip pads in your shoes. If you suspect a poor fit, see if that helps.)

The "shuffler," or "heel-dragger" type, is next on our list. We find ourselves wanting to say, "Why doesn't she pick up her feet?" (Teenagers, attention! Have you heard this before?) The impression we get is that she could be careless, lazy, not too concerned about her appearance, and apt to shy away from responsibility. Not very good, is it?

Another could be the "clumper," whose heavy tread suggests a rolling walk with feet planted firmly at each step. Mentally, we can't help but conjure up a picture of a heavy amazon. To our surprise, as likely as not, the door admits a well-proportioned girl who is not heavy at all. She simply takes long strides without grace, and her echoes have made us think she might be stubborn, rather ruggedly individual, and without a great deal of tact or humor.

Now, we hear a soft footfall with an even step and hardly any sound between putting down the heel and rolling the weight rapidly to the toes. We know the owner will be well-groomed, pleasant to talk to, gentle and relaxed.

Test your own gait—and listen carefully. Only when your steps leave a very little or no noise behind them can you give yourself a high score on a smooth and graceful walk.

You, too, can learn to "walk in beauty."
