Safe Air Standards Suggested
Recommendations for safer flying conditions at Torrance Municipal Airport were presented to the City Council Tuesday.
The suggestions were made by Don Myers, secretary of the Lomita Property Owners and Registered Voters.
They demanded compulsory insurance, elimination of practice flying from the Torrance field, give airport officials more police powers and change of the flight pattern.
The Lomita group said that planes should not be permitted to operate east of Crenshaw Blvd. "unless absolutely necessary."
They asked that Torrance field be closed for practice flying; that this type of operation be conducted in an undeveloped area.
Another request was for halting flight operations during bad weather by granting police powers to airport officials.
The Lomita organization pointed out that they are not only concerned with safety of themselves and their property, but also claim that noise, particularly on weekends and holidays, constitutes a nuisance.

Torrance Quota in Red Cross Fund Drive, Opening Next Month, Is \$6000
An expanded goal of \$6,000—to help provide for the pressing needs of the American Red Cross—will be the determined objective of fund raising volunteers from Torrance.
Announcement of the 1958 Red Cross goal for this community was made today by Chairman Dr. Don Moshos, as fund leaders from here and throughout the Southern Region prepared to journey to the Hacienda Hotel in San Pedro for a noon luncheon to kick off what promises to be one of the most spirited campaigns in the Los Angeles area.
Residential goals totaling \$32,000 have been accepted by the region's six competing communities as follows: Gardena, \$3,250; Torrance, \$6,000; Palms Verdes, \$9,000; Lomita, \$1,000; San Pedro, \$9,500; and Wilmington, \$3,250.
"Because Red Cross must keep pace with the current tempo of our times, success of the 1958 fund campaign is mandatory," declared Dr. Moshos as he called

for combined cooperation of volunteers and contributing residents.
Dr. Moshos underlined two Red Cross services—the blood program and the disaster service—which must be guaranteed "adequate financing" from the 1958 expanded fund appeal. "A booming population—particularly in this part of the country—has brought about an acute need for more and more life-saving blood, and statistics indicate that the Los Angeles Chapter must raise \$650,000 (23 percent) more than last year if it is to meet the demands for whole blood and its derivatives from 153 local hospitals.
With regard to the disaster service, Dr. Moshos pointed out that the reserve fund is still seriously depleted following the national expenditure of \$51,000,000 on recent major disasters.

Harbor Hospital Enlargement to Be Discussed
"The proposed enlargement of Harbor General Hospital, and its relation to the community," will be the subject of an address by Alfred L. Thomas, director of the hospital, at the March 6 meeting of the Lomita Civic League at the Little Theater of the Fleming Junior High School at 8 p.m. The meeting is open to the public.
Thomas is a graduate of Occidental College where he majored in political science and economics. During 28 years of employment by Los Angeles County he has served as a director of research, director of accounts and statistics, business manager in the department of charities, and assistant director of Olive View Sanitarium.
In the absence of the incumbent president of the League, Herbert Brisbin, who will be on his new assignment at TWA as instructor of radar technicians who will service the new jets, Vincent Lechner will have charge of the meeting and will install the following officers:
