Top teams in the Torrance Recreation department open basketball league retained their respective positions following games played last Monday in North High's gym. Kenny's Shoe Repair ran roughshod over the Foods Co. quintet, posting a 53-28 win to remain in the favored spot. Deadeye, Bill Fraser, again scored highest for the winners, putting seven field goals and six free throws, totaling 20 points for the evening. Mary Acosta registered nine for the Foods Co. from his guard position.

Other game results had Wright's team still in second place via a 58-38 win over Knolls Drug Stores melon tossers.
