bonne ave. Both places were entered through the rear doors. Two tires and wheels and a garden hose were taken from a storage shed at the school, 25425 Walnut ave.



Holdup Try Probed by Post Office

Investigation of a robbery attempt of a Harbor City postal substation, in which a woman was clobbered over the head, was turned over to Post Office investigators.

Mrs. Helen Hudson, 58, who resides in the rear of the variety store in which the postal branch is located at 25304 Belle Porte ave., was pistol-whipped when she struggled with a female bandit Saturday morning.

The suspect, who fled from the store after struggling with Mrs. Hudson, is still at large. She failed to obtain any money, because of Mrs. Hudson's bravery.

The woman bandit demanded the postal receipts from Mrs. Hudson's sister, Mrs. Adie Newman, 67, of 1434 W. 253rd st., who was on duty behind the counter.

While Mrs. Newman hesitated, Mrs. Hudson charged out of the back and struggled for the robber's gun.

Police believe that the "woman" bandit may have been a disguised male.

Request Speedup of Center

The Lomita Civic League is the latest of several organizations which will press for a speedup in the acquisition of a Lomita Civic Center.

"We're trying to combine forces so that we can meet with the Supervisors," declared Dr. Richard T. Woods, first vice president of the Lomita Junior Chamber of Commerce, who is spearheading the drive to expedite allocations.

He explained the funds for the acquisition of the center on Narbonne ave. north of Lomita blvd. was budgeted last year, but dropped when the defeated incorporation drive started.

Dr. Woods said that a speedup in funds, now not scheduled for three years, is sought by the Jaycees, the League, The Lomita Property Owners and Taxpayers Association and the Chamber of Commerce.

He said that as soon as support is received from some additional fraternal organizations, the Lomita groups will ask a joint meeting with the Board of Supervisors.

The civic center is to include a sheriff's substation, and branch offices of County departments.

County Rejects Damage Claim of Injured Youths

Damage claims filed by Torrance residents in connection with an auto accident Oct. 7, were recommended for rejection by the County Tuesday.

Parents of the four youngsters injured at Delores near 228th st., filed claims totaling nearly \$1,200,000 against the County.

Claims included \$115,000 sought for Quita Ann Stonesifer of 204 W. 225th pl.; \$115,000 for Cathi Hobbs, of Wilmington; \$850,000 for William J. Hayes, of 1050 W. 227th st., and \$110,000 for Henry H. Morales of Long Beach.

The wreck claimed the lives of the driver and another teenage occupant.

Dr. Dunn to Give Principal Talk During Business-Education Day

Dr. Cecil L. Dunn of Southern Counties Gas Company of California will be the featured speaker at the opening session of Torrance's first city-wide Business-Industry-Education Day on March 17.

The meeting will start at 9 a.m. in the Torrance High School Auditorium according to General Chairman Fred Brunner of the sponsoring Torrance Chamber of Commerce.

Following the welcome from Chamber, city and school officials, Dr. Dunn will deliver an address on the American free enterprise system as it relates to education.

Dr. Dunn joined Southern Counties, a national gas distribution utility serving more than 638,000 customers in a 1,200 Square Mile area in Southern California, in 1952 as financial analyst, and was promoted as Supervisor of the rate section in 1953. Prior to his gas company career, he was professor of economics and chairman of the economic department of Occidental College in Los Angeles for eight years.

He is a graduate of the University of Southern California and has his Masters' and Doctors' Degrees from the Claremont Graduate School.

Dunn served as economic consultant to the Attorney General of California and the Metropolitan-Water District on the Colorado River water litigation between California and Arizona. He is a member of the Pacific Coast Gas Association and the American Gas Association. He is married to the former Ellsabeth Balcom and has three children.

At 10 a.m., the 823 teachers will be hosted by 60 Torrance firms for tours, conferences and luncheon. Assisting Brunner are other members of the Chamber's Education Committee: Dr. Warren Hamilton, Glenn Koger, Fred Todd, Darwin Parrish and Lyle Albino.
