


**LOOKING BACK... AND LOOKING

How PPG fared in 1957



In 1957, PPG established a new high in sales for the third successive year. Consolidated net sales of \$620,803,000 plus \$5,520,000 from investments gave PPG a total revenue of \$626,323,000. Notwithstanding the sharp decline in the fourth quarter of 1957, the high level of sales during the first three quarters, made possible by the operation of the newly completed and expanded facilities, accounted for the highest sales in PPG's history.

During 1957 a total of \$64,003,000 was spent for expansion, replacement and modernization of manufacturing facilities, Research

and engineering development spending, exclusive of capital expenditures, amounted to \$12,645,000 in 1957, an increase of more than 200 per cent over ten years ago.
