Health Center Offers Expectant Parents Class

Spring classes for expectant parents will start in the Torrance Health District, March 20 at 1 p.m., according to Dr. B. A. Kogan, District Health Officer. The classes will be conducted in the Torrance Health Center, 2300 Carson st.

"The classes in no way take the place of regular care by a qualified physician," Dr. Kogan said, "but are an educational service of the County Health Department planned to help parents meet the physical and emotional needs of the infants and growing child."

Miss Ann Snoddy, public health nurse-instructor, will be the instructor. There are no text books to purchase as the course consists of lectures and demonstrations. Motion picture films relating to mother and baby care will be shown and will cover such subjects as the health of the mother before and after the baby arrives, layettes, baby bath technique, and other care of the new infant. "Human Growth," a film, has been booked for the opening class.

School Bus Drivers in Safety Course

Fourteen Torrance Unified School District bus drivers have enrolled in the Truck and Bus Driving Improvement and Safety Course offered by the Safety Education Section of the Los Angeles City Schools and an advisory committee of the Truck and Transportation Industry. This course is being offered in seven sessions of four hours each, Saturday mornings, at George Washington High School in Los Angeles.

This course was designed to improve the method of truck and bus operation through the development of desirable skills and attitudes among drivers; to promote greater street and highway safety; to promote a better understanding as to the relationship of safety through improved driving habits, skills and attitudes.

Speed Violations Rise, Says Highway Patrol

California drivers must exercise more respect for traffic laws if they are to avoid becoming a traffic statistic, warns the California Highway Patrol.

"The growing number of citations issued by the California Highway Patrol is some evidence of the apparent lack of respect for traffic rules and regulations," declared Patrol Commissioner B. R. Caldwell. "During 1957 the Patrol issued 909,333 citations, 307,100 of which were for speed violations. The total also included 12,904 arrests for violations of the laws referring to driving while under the influence of alcohol.

An analysis of 88,886 traffic accidents occurring during 1957 in the areas patrolled by the Patrol reveals that 82,630 or 93 per cent of them were charged to traffic violations," Caldwell stated. "The evidence emphasizes the fact that violating traffic laws will eventually lead you to an accident.
