Little Edward was adopted while the Feists were living in Pennsylvania but the twins' adoption will be local. (Probation period is not over.)

"So many wonderful things have happened to us since we moved to Torrance," said Mrs. Feist. "We are buying a new home and furnishing it gradually without going into debt."

The Feists, who moved here two years ago, March 29th, had agreed upon marriage, that they wanted a large family, so were delighted when it seemed their hopes were to be fulfilled.

When Mrs. Feist lost her baby, and later a second one, her physician suggested adoption as the solution. Shortly thereafter they took Edward at 18 months, and following the preliminary probation period, adopted him as their own.

Later they made application for a second child but before it could be accomplished, had decided to make the move to California.

Upon coming to Torrance, the Feists decided to add to their family with what they hoped might be "a little sister for Edward."

"But the adoption agencies take the proper attitude that

you take what you get when you become natural parents, so why not by adoptive parenthood," explained Mrs. Feist.

The Feists loved children so much that they didn't much care whether they got another boy or a girl. But when they learned that only two adoptive children were allowed a family, unless a handicapped child was accepted, they were still hopeful of their larger family.

"When they called me from agency about five months ago, and told me to sit down before they could give me the news, I was sure they must have a handicapped child for us. And that was all right too."

"I was so thrilled I could hardly speak," said Mrs. Feist. "I ran around the neighborhood spreading our good news, and when my husband came home and I told him, he wouldn't believe me until I cried."

### Brownies Give Surprise Party


