





"Interviews with candidates  
for the position of president of  
El Camino College are still in  
progress," Forrest G. Murdock,  
retiring president, announced to-  
day.

President Murdock, who an-  
nounced on December 17 that  
he was resigning the post to en-  
ter retirement, noted that the  
college Board of Trustees hopes  
to complete screening this week.  
More than 30 candidates from  
all sectors of the nation submit-  
ted applications for the college  
office.

Announcement of the name of  
President Murdock's successor  
is expected to come shortly. It  
was indicated. The new presi-  
dent will assume office on July 1.  
Murdock, who figures promi-  
nently in the early planning of  
El Camino, has been the sole  
president to date. The college  
has grown to an enrollment ex-  
ceeding 9500 during his 11-year  
term of office.
