Children make very cooperative and pleasant patients. Children that go regularly to a dentist eat better grow more sturdy and are healthier.

"I have bad pyorrhea. What can be done for this?" asks Mrs. P. L. F. of Torrance.

Pyorrhea can be detrimental to the health of the patient. In addition it can have bad effects hygienically as well as socially.


