**Retention of Present Salary Scale For Public Employees Urged by Group**

"Hold the state salary structure at its 1957-58 levels," S. J. Arnold, general manager of California Taxpayers' association, today urged the members of the Legislature.

In an open letter to the members of the Legislature, Arnold said:

"The organized taxpayers of California ask that you continue to hold the state's salary structure for 1958-59 within its generous limits for 1957-58.

"Taxpayers have watched legislative action on the salary sections—as well as the other parts of the state budget—with more than usual concern this year.

"State salary levels have great influence on the determination of salaries under the 'prevailing wage' concept. The 'prevailing wage' is the basis for salaries in the larger local government units within our state.

"In turn, salaries of the state and the larger local government units in California set the pattern for salaries of all the other local governments in the state.

"By holding the state salary structure at its 1957-58 limits, you will set a solid example of wisdom for local governing boards throughout the state—the county boards of supervisors, city councils, school boards, and other local district boards.

"Not only this, but by your responsible leadership in making this difficult decision, you will strengthen mightily the local governing boards in the decisions on local government salaries they must make in the next few months. Local boards and taxpayers have a mutual desire to avoid unnecessary increases in local property taxes, and the size of any local government's property tax levy depends in large part on its salary structure.

"We strongly urge that in your final passage of the state budget you hold the state salary structure at its 1957-58 levels."
