

Lighting Petitions Complete

John Brady, chairman of the Lighting Committee for Southwood Homeowners' Association, announced today that the petitions are complete.

The homeowners' lighting committee set up five captains and 45 block chairmen to circulate the 50 petitions and secure 60 per cent of the residents' signatures by the deadline of April 15.

The captains and their petition carriers, with a little under three weeks to canvass the entire Southwood area, covered the 2700 homes, even though they were hampered by Easter vacations and continuous rain. The 50 petitions circulated the newly formed petitions, allowing homeowners to purchase street lights on the installment plan. The following area captains reported the percentages of signatures secured: Area 1, Captain Willis Delpendang reported 72.5 per cent; Area 2, Captain Bob Fuhmann reported 73 per cent; Area 3, Captain F. Austin Overholtz, reported 69.7 per cent; Area 4, Captain Lee Sechler reported 83.5 per cent; and Area 5, Captain Marvin Lambertz, reported 62 per cent. Brady reported that the overall percentage was 72.14 per cent, well exceeding the required 60 per cent to make the petitions effective and bring them before the City Council for action.


