Four Hurt In Auto Accidents

Four persons were injured in traffic accidents in Torrance Friday, with two of them occurring in the same location.

The two accidents took place on Pacific Coast highway between Crenshaw Blvd. and Hillworth st. within 70 minutes of each other.

Most seriously injured was Barney Sanchez Jr., 44, of 25303 Weston road, who is in critical condition at Kaiser Foundation Hospital, Harbor City, police said.

He suffered a broken knee cap, leg fracture, possible broken jaw, pelvis, foot, and ruptured spleen in the two-car collision with an auto driven by Gust Raymond Hiekscher, 27, of 1107 Atlantic drive, Compton.

To Hospital Officers G. G. Snyder and Blyn Boyce said that Hiekscher was taken to Harbor General Hospital with serious injuries as a result of the head-on crash.

In the second accident at the location, Mounce Jackson, 41, of Tustin, Calif., was seriously injured when his truck spun on its back and hit two steel gas vents.

The truck was driven by Bob Dale Rubottom, 18, a sailor stationed in San Diego, whom Jackson had picked up to drive the truck because he was tired.



Hotel, Terminal Building Planned at City Airport

Construction of a \$1,000,000 hotel and \$350,000 terminal building at Torrance Municipal Airport will start in six months, E. E. Wilson, developer, announced today.

He said he is entering final negotiations with the city for a 50-year lease. The City Council has already approved the project in principle.

Wilson said that the resort-type hotel with central swimming pool and patios, will have 110 rooms in its two-story construction.

Conference Room It will contain conference rooms, one with a capacity of 400 persons; a restaurant, cocktail lounge and food service around the pool.

Wilson, president of the Driftwood Motel, said Architect Ragnar C. Qvale, designer of the Skywriter Hotel in Phoenix, will prepare plans.

Entertainment and dancing will be featured at the hotel.

Terminal Building The terminal building will provide 36 offices, including administrative facilities for Airport Manager Jack Egan. Offices will be air-conditioned and sound-proofed.

Adjacent to the terminal building will be a new CAA-approved flight tower and a transit terminal where pilots will be able to file flight plans, obtain weather information and radio reports.

Wilson said that all efforts will be made to accommodate executive flights with special services to make Torrance Airport attractive to them.

Travel Bureau He said he hopes a travel agency and car rental service will be included among offices and stores in his development.

Under terms of the lease, the city will receive free office rental for its administrative staff, and the terminal building will be turned over to the city in 15 years.

Parking for 400 cars will be provided in the terminal area, and additional space around the hotel.

Re zoning Urged for Land Near New Shopping Center

Small Attendance Nearly Stops Town Hall Program

A Town Hall meeting on Juvenile Delinquency was almost cancelled when only a score of persons appeared to hear District Attorney William B. McKesson and other civic leaders discuss the problem Wednesday night.

Spokesmen for the Torrance Coordinating Council expressed disappointment over the small audience which showed up for the widely publicized event.

Small Audience Not more than 20 persons attended the meeting in the 828-seat auditorium.

McKesson, formerly a judge in the Los Angeles County Juvenile Court, took an optimistic view toward youthful conduct.

"You don't need to lose heart over our boys and girls of 1958," he assured the audience.

He said that the number of delinquents appears so much greater today than it did 30 years ago because police departments are keeping closer records of juvenile misconduct.

If he gave a specific blame for juvenile crime, it was to say that in a metropolitan area, personal relationships among neighbors has been largely sacrificed.

"You may have made conditions which are being faced by the boys and girls of today that you did not face when you were a teenager," McKesson declared.

He said that a study into solution of juvenile delinquency attributes the cause to 107 different reasons.

"Since there is no single cause for juvenile delinquency, there is no single cure," he said.

Jail Fills With 22 Boys and Girls

In a crackdown on curfew violations, Torrance police filled the jail with teenagers Friday night with as many as 22 boys and girls in custody at one time.

Enforcement of the city's 10 p. m. deadline for minors without lawful business was prompted by a wave of auto accessory thefts, juvenile officers said.

The order to pull in all teenagers who are found loitering after the deadline was issued yesterday by Lt. D. C. Cook, head of the juvenile bureau.

Drinking Party Among the youngsters brought to the police station Friday were six boys and four girls who were found drinking at a beach party at Paseo de Playa and Paseo de la Serena. The youngsters were aged 15 to 17.

Two other boys were taken into custody when they were found cruising the beach area. Police said they found a sawed-off pool cue, fashioned into a club, in the youths' auto.

Other boys were apprehended in the downtown area at various locations.

Call Parents Juvenile officers said that under the new enforcement program, the parents of youngsters taken into custody are called and told to pick up their children personally.

When they arrive, they are informed about the curfew law provision and asked to sign an affidavit that they have read the law.

Officers said that if the same teenagers are found violating the curfew law again, the parents are subject to prosecution.

"The place was swarming with parents," commented Lt. Ted Morris, graveyard watch commander at the police station. By this morning, all the apprehended youngsters had been released into the custody of their parents.



City Firm Merger Told

Merger of the National Supply Company and Armo Steel Corp. was announced this week by officials of both companies.

A spokesman for National Supply, which operates one of its seven plants at 1524 Border ave., Torrance, said there will be no immediate changes at the local plant.

National Supply is the world's largest supplier of oil well equipment and supplies. Armo is the seventh-ranking U. S. steel company.

The company spokesman for National said that the merger will be of long-term benefit to both companies.

He said that National Supply stockholders approved the merger at their annual meeting on April 16, while Armo stockholders ratified the proposal Thursday.

National Supply's Torrance plant normally employs between 1300 and 1400 workers.

Seek New One-Year Contract

Employees of Douglas Aircraft Torrance and El Segundo plants were polled on a strike vote Tuesday at a mass meeting at Shrine Auditorium.

District Lodge 720 of the International Association of Machinists, which represents workers at the two plants, called the meeting to authorize a walkout if negotiations for new wage contracts fail. President R. E. Roberts announced.

He said the local represents 16,000 employees in the two Douglas plants, 4500 of them in Torrance.

"We're after a new contract, not a strike," the union official said.

Roberts said that his union is seeking a 6 per cent general pay in crease, severance pay and a union shop.

He said that a strike vote has been authorized by the United Auto Workers, which represents the Douglas Long Beach and Lockheed Aircraft.

The meeting at 2 p. m. Sunday also was called by IAM Lodge 1578, which represents Douglas Santa Monica workers.

He said that the aircraft workers' unions are forming a united program in negotiations with the aviation firms.

Roberts said that Douglas has made an offer on pay increases.

He added that the Douglas El Segundo and Torrance employees are among the last to conduct a strike authorization meeting.

Under its contract, Roberts explained, the unions must give the company a seven-day notice if it calls a walkout.

INQUEST POSTPONED

Inquest into the death of Mrs. Priscilla Young, 37, who died March 31 as result of an abortion, has been postponed until Thursday.
