PUT YOUR BEST FOOT FORWARD

Today we will continue on the subject of hands as promised last time. Unless we can observe what we are doing that is not best, we cannot hope to correct it, can we?

When we see someone idly drumming their fingers on the table or arm of a chair, what do you think? You have no choice but to assume that they are bored, impatient, or ill-at-ease, and it makes you wonder self-consciously if you are the cause. This could be only an absent-minded habit, and rarely the person is not aware of what an adverse impression it gives to others.

Unless finger wiggling, massaging the hands, wringing them nervously, rubbing two fingers together endlessly, or clapping hands and rolling the thumbs are either indications of advanced age with possible approach of senility or of complete lack of interest. Why? Because confident, interested, vital people do not do these things with their hands. We do see young men and women use these gestures and know that thoughtlessness is the cause. The time and attention necessary to rid oneself of such unflattering habits is more than worth the effort.

With today's modern conveniences, it is only careless if a woman's hands look rough and work-hardened. Good hand lotion can be had for pennies and durable, inexpensive rubber gloves are a wise investment, especially for the garden enthusiast. For those of you who say plaintively, "I just can't work with gloves," then do take this hint. Before you start gardening or chasing grime with a vengeance, scratch your nails down a cake of soap. This puts a coating of soap under the nails and prevents embedded dirt that refuses to budge even with a nail brush. Also, put on a liberal amount of your favorite hand cream or lotion to protect the skin and accumulated dirt will wash away more easily. Try rubber gloves if you never have. They are really "hand-savers" and once you are used to them, you will never want to be without them.

There is a knack to applying hand lotion for best results. Use at least twice a day to replace oils and moisture lost in frequent immersing of hands in water. It takes no longer to use it correctly than to just dab on a few drops carelessly. Keep a handy dispenser of lotion in kitchen and bathroom and use after each time hands are in water. The results will be most gratifying. Apply generously, then hold hands UP and rub from the nails down as though you were putting on a new pair of kid gloves. Massage each finger, rub into cuticle firmly. Do not forget the ELBOWS. With the remaining excess on hands, always give elbows a few circular strokes. They show age so quickly and are not too attractive at best. If yours are dark, rough or dry looking, try this today. Take five minutes to sit with each elbow in half a lemon or grapefruit. Do it while you are waiting for your polish to dry completely. Try this once a week or until they are bleached soft and white, and then keep them that way by remembering to apply lotion each time you use it on your hands.

There is nothing like a professional manicure occasionally to make you conscious of how nice your hands can look and to encourage you to take better care of them. In between, you should allow time once a week for a few minutes of hand grooming. See that the nails are filed smoothly to conform to the finger tips. Try to make the whole nail form as near an oval as you can. Don't file too close at the sides or nails will break easily. Chipped polish is unsightly and inexcusable. If you do not have time to keep it in perfect condition, then use only a colorless polish which does not show chipping. Hands should have clean, clipped, whitened (after scrubbing, try dipping in talcum powder) nails free from ugly hangnails, reddened knuckles or dry, chapped-looking skin.

When you have hands you can be proud of, it is surprising how easy it is to master relaxed, easy gestures that bespeak character and beauty. Remember, "hands do talk."
