The Redondo Beach Church of Religious Science is embarking on an intensive program of fund raising for a new building. The building will be situated at the corner of Palos Verdes Drive and Miramar in the Hollywood Riviera.

The Church of Religious Science of Redondo Beach has been holding its services in the Redondo Beach Masonic Temple for the past nine years. It was at this time that the present minister Dr. Earl D. Barnum (Reverend Barnum) was called to the area for this church. There are about 25 members at its time (1949), and the membership has grown steadily.

Initial Goal
This initial canvass has for a goal \$80,000, to build for the immediate minimum needs of the church. It is planned to have for an ultimate goal of a \$200,000-\$300,000 installation at the new location.

Church Sponsors Narcotics Talk

Henry B. Hall, Executive of the Narcotic Educational Foundation of America, speaks Sunday evening at 7:30 p. m. in the Torrance Hope Evangelical United Brethren Church on "Youth and Narcotics." Hall, outstanding authority on narcotics and crime prevention, states there was a major crime in America last year every 13.3 seconds. Although moral citizens do not commit these crimes they are necessarily often the victims. Hall further states that narcotics are responsible for one-half of all crimes in metropolitan areas and everyone shares the cost and the danger that results.

"Our recent research and interviews with many youthful drug users reveal the inroads his evil is making upon children even within reach of the church and it is only by informing and arousing the adult churchmen that this trend can be reversed," states Hall.

Rev. Monrad Bergesen, pastor of the church in which Mr. Hall will speak April 27th, urges attendance of every person interested in the protection of youth and the moral welfare of our community. This will be one of the extraordinary services of the year, being sponsored by the Torrance Ministerial Association. Hall has served as the Executive of the Narcotic Education Foundation of America since 1941. Years of prior experience well qualified him for that position. He has talked to youthful offenders and studied their problems, including many of the last few months. He has likewise interviewed parents and peddlers and ministers, doctors and judges and statesmen. He will bring a wealth of knowledge to benefit from.
