Mr. Zamperini has won public attention by more than his track record. While on the 1936 Olympic team in Berlin, Germany, he climbed the flag pole of the chancellery and took down the swastika flag of Hitler. During World War II he was adrift on the Pacific Ocean for the longest time in the history of the armed forces, 47 days. Mr. Zamperini spent two and a half years in a Japanese prison camp and was declared officially dead by the War Department. There is now an army airfield named in his honor, Zamperini Airport. All men of the church and community are invited to hear this famous man.
