

Site Purchased for Lutheran Church of Good Shepherd

With the purchase of a site for the Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd in west Torrance announced this week, plans are now being made for the construction of a church building for this new congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church and the National Lutheran Council, according to the Rev. Gerald W. Garlid, pastor.

The new church will be located at the northeast corner of Torrance Boulevard and Victor st., where approximately 3 acres of land have been purchased for the present and future development of the congregation. Funds for the purchase of the site and the construction of the first unit of the church are made available to the congregation by the Board of Home Missions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church, with headquarters in Minneapolis, Minn.

Architectural plans for the new church structures are now being made by Edward D. Davies, Pasadena. As soon as the plans are completed, building contracts will be let, and construction will begin.
