Legislators Still Busy at Work Despite Adjournment of Capitol

When your legislature is not in session in Sacramento, the several one-house and joint interim committees have been set up to carry on their work of investigating the many problems which may require legislative action. Despite the pressure put on most legislators by the forthcoming primary election on June 3, many of us will be devoting a good deal of our time during the next few weeks to the activities of these interim groups. During the month of May, at least 16 meetings of Senate, Assembly and joint committees will

be held at various communities around the state. About half of the members of each house are members of these groups, and will participate in the hearings. The subjects to be investigated at these hearings range from inspection fees on agricultural minerals, through cost allocations and reimbursement on water projects, to an investigation of negotiations between the Dodgers Baseball Club and the City of Los Angeles. The places where meetings will be held include towns like Bishop and Buena Park, as well as larger cities such as San Francisco, Los Angeles and San Diego.

These interim committees play a very important role in the efficient and equitable operation of your California legislature. They enable us to do something that it would be well-nigh impossible to achieve in any working session of our two houses. That is, to study the matters before us with great thoroughness and in small detail. They also permit us to hear all sides of a controversial issue, and give us a better opportunity to separate facts from arguments.

In a working session of the legislature, each of us is likely to be so intent on putting across the particular bills of importance to him and his district, that facts and sides of issues get assigned unusual values. Their worth becomes thought of more in terms of the varied compromises needed to get desired legislation passed and approved by the Governor. Sometimes, as the late unlamented water battle showed, compromises are not easily reached.

To put it still another way, the interim committee is one way of putting the performance on the road, and bringing the legislature to people all over the state. Not all our citizens have the time, nor can afford to travel to Sacramento to inform us of their views on legislative proposals of importance to their lives, businesses, or standards of living.

The interim committee is the method by which we bring the legislature in action to the people, giving everyone who takes advantage of it a full opportunity to state his case and get it in the written record. In this way, the interim committee saves both money and time for the citizen taxpayer. It also protects him from having enacted laws which have not been completely thought out in their drafting, laws which might not be for the general good of all California.

So, the next time you see in the newspapers an announcement that a particular legislative interim committee is to meet near your home, remember that it is doing so at least partly as a convenience to you, as an important factor in the whole
