



Darwin Parrish New Head of Dental Health Group

Darwin Parrish, Torrance businessman and former member of the board of education, was elected president of the Torrance Dental Health Association at the organization's annual dinner meeting this week. He succeeds Reid Bundy, who has been president for the past year.

Parrish will take over his new office at the first meeting of the association's board of directors June 4.

Elected to serve with Parrish for the coming year were Jim Becker, first vice president; Mrs. A. C. Turner, second vice president; Mrs. Matthew Humber, secretary, and Mrs. E. G. Collins, treasurer.

Mrs. Ralph M. McBee, executive secretary of the organization since its founding here six years ago, will continue in that post.

The election was held at more than 70 persons met in the Woman's Club to hear the annual reports and to view films of the dental inspection program of first graders conducted by Torrance dentists earlier this spring.

Approximately 2500 children were examined under the pro-

gram sponsored by the Dental Health Association, Richard Hubert, school representative, reported at the meeting.

During the six years the organization has existed here, it has provided dental work at a cost of \$14,030.50 to children in Torrance schools, Mrs. McBee reported.

The money has been spent for 409 X-rays, 221 cleanings, 586 extractions, 2682 fillings, and 131 special items, including dentures and other work. Contributions from service clubs, labor unions, PTA units, and other organizations have totaled \$13,531.58 during the six years. Repayment by families whose children have been helped through the program has permitted the expenditures above the contributions, Mrs. McBee explained.

Brothers Fined for Bar Brawl

Two brothers, who allegedly started a bar brawl in which one of them suffered a gunshot wound and the other a pistol-whipping, had even more trouble when they were fined \$25 each on a disturbance charge Monday.

Cruz Suarez, 46, of 1219 256th st., a machinist, was whacked over the head by Ronald Barnett, 26, a special security officer at the Gold Star Cafe 813 Border ave., police said.

His brother, Jose, 44, of 1515 214th st., a steelworker, wound up with a bullet wound after he allegedly attempted to wrest Barnett's revolver from him and the gun went off, officers said.

Investigators said that the brothers had created a disturbance on the dance floor of the cafe, and resisted when Barnett attempted to evict them from the place.

The Suarez brothers were given a 120-day suspended jail sentence and placed on summary probation for six months when they appeared before Municipal Judge John A. Shidler Monday.
