Apartment Zone Case Set July 8

The controversial proposed rezoning of industrial land for apartment development will come up before the city council July 8 for its third and final hearing. The planning commission has recommended denial of the application by Bjorklund and Smith to build apartments on a 100-acre site at the southwest corner of Crenshaw and Sepulveda blvds.

The zone change which seeks R-3 and C-1 uses on the property now in a manufacturing zone, is also opposed by the Torrance Industries Tax Committee.

In opposing the zone change, its secretary, F. W. Mills, wrote: "We would like to state that when industrial properties are rezoned to residential, there is a great decrease in the potential tax value, therefore a major reduction in the possible tax revenue, notwithstanding sales or use tax."

He also pointed out that a substantial increase in municipal and educational service costs will result by any change to residential purposes.
