Eight Torrance High Grid Players in Optimist Tilt

Tentative all star Bay League and Pioneer League Football teams have been named to oppose each other in the third annual Optimist football game to be played August 15 at 8:30 p.m. on the El Camino College grid-iron.

The Pioneer League team will be coached by Hal Chauncey and his staff from Hawthorne High School. Chauncey, who has an outstanding coaching record at Hawthorne High School, where he has won or tied for 4 championships in 7 years, was the losing coach in the initial Optimist Football game won by the Bay League 13-0 in 1956.

Chauncey believes that he will be in a better position to get his team ready for football this summer than two years ago. Hawthorne's Mike Foreman and Morningside's Maurice Guthrie were selected on the squad but have entered the Armed Forces and Coach Chauncey has not selected replacements as yet. The Pioneer League will draw uniforms on July 25 and start practice July 31 at Hawthorne High School. Practice will be daily at 9 a.m.

The Bay League team will be

coached by Leon McLaughlin and his staff from Santa Monica High School. Coach McLaughlin, after a successful playing career at UCLA and the Los Angeles Rams won the Bay League title in his first year at Santa Monica.

The Bay League team will be made up of eight players from Torrance High School, six players from Santa Monica High School, four players from Inglewood High School and two players each from Leuzinger High School, Redondo High School and Mira Costa High School.





Slowpoke Motorist Is Road Hazard
