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Story Telling Becoming Lost Art, Says Torrance School Teacher

"Story telling is becoming a lost art," declares Mrs. Claire (John G. L.) Crain, teacher of a combined first-second grade class at Flavian School. "The average family has lost TV take over."

The teacher, who has two teen age sons, believes story telling should be an important part of a child's education for its value in stimulating and strengthening his imagination.

By story telling, Mrs. Crain does not mean story reading, valuable as that is. Nor does she advise breaking into the magic moments of a story telling session to show illustrations.

Use Imagination

"The child should picture his own character," she says. "He should learn that all people do not see things in the same way."

Mrs. Crain developed her own story telling ability this summer by taking a six weeks course in the subject at Long Beach State College. Her theories reflect thoughts presented there and accepted thoughtfully by the students.

The local teacher has long believed that families achieve a greater closeness through enjoying stories together. "Though each may see the characters and action in an individual way," she says, "all gain a unity of feeling through the story experience with others."
