If there was a prize offered for the neatest purse, how would you do? Are you one of the majority who would have to blush for shame if suddenly called upon to open your purse and reveal its contents? Try right now opening your purse and locating your lipstick or front door key in less than 12 seconds. Couldn't do it? Then do read on.

You get an impression of chaos and confusion, don't you, when you see a woman rummage through her purse churning up the contents like a mixer? How often are we held up getting on a bus or in a store line by a "forager" who practically has to go in head first to locate anything. 
