

El Camino Expects Record Enrollment Opening Day

El Camino College will record a new high for enrollment marks when it greets a first-day enrollment of 9700 students on Monday, it was announced by Merl F. Sloan, Director of Student Personnel today. This is an increase of 1000 students over last year's first-day enrollment.

Late registrants may swell the total enrollment figure to 10,500. One last opportunity to register is offered on Tuesday, September 16, between 1 and 3 p.m. and 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. Although they may have to take late afternoon or evening classes, there are still openings in about 30 per cent of the 1136 classes being offered this fall, it was announced.

In preparation for enrollment, 2700 high school graduates received counseling service and testing. These services were received by an additional 1500 full-

time students during the spring semester. Approximately 5500 part-time day and evening students checked their programs with counselors upon registering during August.

The president indicated that because of the larger enrollment of full-time students as compared to the increase of part-time students, it has been necessary to add late afternoon and evening classes.

With the graduation of 13 seniors, there are positions open from tackle, and 3 backfield positions.

Only at end with Chuck Webb and Dennis Berry, and at fullback, filled by captain, and All-Pioneer Leaguer, Ernie Thompson, will first stringers be returning.

Line coach Ed Levy, has quite a few prospects for the first string positions. George Morgan, Paul Shaffer, and John Simpson all have an equal chance at center.

Morgan is the more experienced man, but Shaffer is probably the roughest man on the squad, while Simpson, after two years of Bee football is big and rangy and could fill in the position.

At guard, Dick Bybee and Ed Jauriqui look like the best bets. Possibly one of the stronger spots will be at tackle, where a real fight for that position is shaping up.

Dave Christensen, George Foutis, Steve Harper, Dan Chadwick, Mike Henderson, and John Sibley are all fighting for the job.

Coach Shoup is forced to move his veteran left end, Chuck Webb into the left half slot. Steve Mearing figures to take over the spot, along with Dennis Berry at right end. Dwayne Merrill and Steve Sandberg will add depth to the position.

The most unsure position on the team is quarterback. With no returning veterans, the spot lies open to four prospects.

The best bet looks like Senior Bill Hall, but Juniors Jim Laird, Dick Hedgecock, and John McCall could fill this important position.

With the four halfbacks that carried the load last year gone, a real problem exists at that spot.

Hershel Lawson will move up into a starting role. Webb will move from end into the left half slot. Don Roach and Bill Car-

enter, from the junior varsity's move into the picture.

It will be necessary to use quarterbacks Laird and Hedgecock as reserve backs, as the backfield is very thin.



